Second Bouvet DXPedition Scrubbed by Weather

If you are one of the many who is desperately in need of Bouvet Island (2^{nd} most needed) for

DXCC you are going to have to wait a little longer. After a busted boat in last year's effort (3Y0Z) by a mostly American crew this year's effort also was scrubbed Thursday after the crew was subjected to a horrific storm that caused some damage to their ship. The crew was made up of Polish hams (3Y0I) with at least one other member (from Japan).



The 3Y0I team expected to arrive at Bouvet Island on March 26 or 27 however, they encountered a storm and the *Atlantic Tuna's* captain decided to sail away from the island for saftey reasons. When the storm winds and seas increased, the captain made the decision to return to Capetown, South Africa, where the voyage started.

The ship suffered some damage including to it's navigational system.

Once in port, there will be a discussion about the continuation of the DXPedition.

ARISS Seeks Hosts for Ham Radio Contacts with Space Station Crew Members

Starting on April 1, Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (<u>ARISS</u>) will accept applications from US schools, museums, science centers, and community youth organizations (working individually or together) interested in hosting contacts with orbiting crew members on the International Space Station (ISS). Contacts will be scheduled between January 1 and June 30, 2020.

Each year, ARISS provides tens of thousands of students with opportunities to learn about space technologies and communications through Amateur Radio. The program provides learning opportunities by connecting students to astronauts aboard the ISS through a partnership between ARRL, AMSAT, and NASA, as well as other Amateur Radio organizations and worldwide space agencies. The program's goal is to inspire students to pursue interests and careers in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) and Amateur Radio.

"Educators overwhelmingly report that student participation in the ARISS program stimulates interest in STEM subjects and in STEM careers," ARISS said in announcing the contact opportunities. "One educator wrote, 'Many of the middle school students who took part in and attended the ARISS contact have selected science courses in high school as a result of that contact." ARISS says enthusiasm sparked by a school contact has led to an interest in ham radio among students and to the creation of ham radio clubs in schools. Some educators have even become radio amateurs after experiencing a contact with an ISS crew member.

ARISS is looking for organizations capable of attracting large numbers of participants and integrating the contact into a well-developed, exciting education plan. Students can learn about satellite communications, wireless technology, science research conducted on the ISS, radio science, and any related STEM subject. Students learn to use Amateur Radio to talk directly to an astronaut and ask their STEM-related questions. ARISS will help educational organizations locate Amateur Radio groups who can assist with equipment for this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for students.

The deadline to submit proposals is May 15. Proposal webinars for guidance and questions will be offered on April 11 at 7 PM EDT (2300 UTC) and on April 16 at 9 PM EDT (0100 UTC on Wednesday, April 17). <u>Advance registration</u> is required. <u>More details</u>, such as expectations, proposal guidelines, and the proposal form, are on the ARISS website.

Rusty KB5R reported that the Annual Banquet/BBQ would be at his home in Sunny Glen on April 27th. He requested members to contact Sarah concerning dishes to be contributed. There was no new information on solar panels or wind chargers as possible current options at repeater sites.

NEW BUSINESS:

The Midland HamFest on March 16th was discussed. The HamFest is also the ARRL WestTexas Convention.

The grass and pasture conditions following good summer and fall rains with high potential for grass fires were discussed. Repeater sites for BBARC as well as law enforcement agencies are at risk in the fire season. BBARC needs to be ready for communication activation should a fire be reported.

Bob WA5ROE discussed the need to have the BBARC Communication RV inspected and backup batteries installed. Authorization for the purchase of batteries up to \$500 was approved on a motion by Rusty KB5R and a second by Stephen KE5WCP.

Jim KD5KBU reported that the spring Hammerfest had been canceled, but Cyclefest in September would be held as planned.

The program was presented by Zack Smith on Railroad Communication, the frequencies in use and how the various frequencies are utilized. A diagram was displayed showing the antenna farm installed on the diesel locomotives with 20 or more individual antennas. Zack is employed by BNSF Railway.

He also discussed the Parks on the Air (POTA) program with operators making as many contacts as possible from National Parks, National Monuments, National Historic locations, State Parks and other state and federal tourist facilities.

The meeting adjourned at 8:40 PM.
